High School in Kashiwa with International Exchange programs Series I

We sent a questionnaire to high schools in Kashiwa to know international related activities the school might offer. This is the first of the series.

Kashiwa Municipal High School

Q1

Please tell us about your international exchange programs.

A1

We have one sister school each in the US, Australia, and China. Using the advantage of being a municipal school, we can have many opportunities of international exchanges. We have a couple of exchange programs for our students. Every year the entire 2nd grade students in International Education Class visited North High School (NHS), our sister school in Torrance, CA and stayed in a homestay for 8 days in November. In exchange, students from NHS came to our school and stayed with our students' family in the following May. Another program is for applicants from all grades. They visited the sister schools in Australia and China every other year for a language program, and students from the sister schools visited us as well.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic we had to cancel these programs in 2020, but we connected with NHS via on-line twice last year to keep up with the local news and played quiz.

Q2

Are there any foreign students in your school?

If so, which country are they from?

A2

We have total of 16 foreign students in the international education class in every grade. They are from Ukraine, Philippines, Nigeria, China, Brazil, Mexico, Pakistan, and Nepal.

Q3

Are you accepting returnees?

A3

Yes, we accept them through the Chiba prefecture public high school special admission selection program for the returnees. The admitted students will be in the international education class.

Q4

Do you allocate a certain number to foreign students? Are there any foreign students who take a regular entrance examination?

A4

We accept foreign students through a special admission selection in the same way as the returnees. They will be in the international education class. If foreign students want to be in the regular classes, they must take the regular entrance examination. There are about 25 students per grade in the international education class that we call Class A, and they stay in the class for the entire 3 years of high school. In many cases we receive a request from junior high school prior to entrance and we discuss entrance requirements.

Q5

Do you have programs to support foreign students?

A5

We have an international department to support foreign and returnee students, and to manage study abroad programs for regular students. After admitted, we test foreign and returnee students to know their Japanese comprehension ability. If needed we give them special Japanese class instead of regular class to strengthen a particular part of Japanese such as classic Japanese. We have support teachers to help them with a particular subject. When a foreign or returnee student needs help with Japanese, we offer supplemental lessons after school: Every day for the 1st graders, and 2 or 3 days a week for the 2nd and 3rd graders. Clerks in the international department support their students by checking their progress and by keeping in touch with their parents.

Tokyo 2020 Olympics Volunteers Special - I

Moved by the words from the athletes

Moto Hashimoto (Kashiwa resident)

I thought it would be a once in a lifetime opportunity so applied to be an Olympic volunteer. I was assigned to the press department of archery and worked 5 days in an interview area called the mix zone. I asked the press which athlete they wanted to interview and guided the athlete to the zone after a match. It was fun to be able to communicate with both reporters and athletes in English. I also cheered every athlete in the best way I could when they passed the area to go to the match.

When Mr. Muto lost his individual match, he said in the interview, “Wind had nothing to do with my loss. It was my ability. We won the bronze medal in the team competition as a team.” His match was held right after the storm and the wind was strong, but he accepted the result humbly and bowed deeply even to us volunteers. Such modest attitude moved me profoundly.

Mr. Furukawa who won the bronze medal in the individual competition mentioned, “The volunteers cheered me before the match by saying ‘Ganbatte kudasai’ – do your best. That made me realize that this Olympics was indeed held in Japan and gave me power.” I am thankful to know people not only being splendid as athlete but also wonderful as human in this experience.

My wish to be an Olympics volunteer came true

I was a university freshman in 1964 when the Olympics was held in Tokyo the last time. Since my university was close to the National Stadium, some older students worked as volunteers. Their volunteer uniform looked particularly bright and that made me determine I would be like them if there was an opportunity.

My wish came true in the Tokyo 2020 and I was assigned as a “field cast” and “city cast”. Volunteer orientations were held twice in the Olympics Memorial Center and more than ten times online. We learned the history and meanings of the Olympics and Paralympics, overview of each game, and how to support spectators. We also took an English comprehension test.

As a “field cast” I was assigned to weightlifting at Tokyo International Forum. My job was to guide VIPs, press, and the athletes. I worked for 10 days, 4pm to 11pm with dinner, holding “Wear a Mask”, “Don’t Eat and Drink” and the placard that you see in my photo. There were many Eastern European and Central and South American people in the venue and many times they didn’t understand English. One man was in a hurry and showed his smartphone screen with “Where is the restroom?” so I guided him in Japanese and with gestures. There were about 50 volunteers in my area (with only 3 men) and among us there were Tunisian and Taiwanese who were living in Japan and fluent in Japanese, and volunteers from Fukuoka and Hyogo prefectures.

I understand that there were negative opinions about holding this Olympics, but athletes were happy to be able to participate in it even if they couldn’t win a medal. I was mostly impressed by the following athletes who set the world records: Ms. Miyake in the 49kg class for being a 5 consecutive Olympics participant, a female player from Uzbekistan whose entire body but face and hands were covered with black cloth, the first female Philippines gold medalist in the 55kg class, a New Zealand player who underwent sex reassignment surgery, and a male Georgia athlete in the 109kg class.

I was tired every night when I arrived Kashiwa Station, but I was happy if my work as a volunteer was helping someone, somehow.
