

The lecturer was Dr. Connor Bottrell, who came from Canada to the Kavli Institute for the Physics and Mathematics of the Universe at the University of Tokyo Kashiwanoha Campus. He has been in Japan for about a year and a half, but since he speaks English in his daily life at his research institute, the event was held in English with interpreters.

The first half of the session featured outdoor sports such as sailing, coastal hiking, crabbing, surfing, touring, and cross-country skiing in the great outdoors in Canada from west (Vancouver) to east (Montreal), as well as nature and wildlife in the national parks in the Rocky Mountains and the

Exchange Program Inspired Me to Study in the U.S.

As an exchange student in 2019, I stayed in the sister city of Torrance, California, for about three weeks. It was the first time I participated in KIRA's activities. Currently, due to the influence of the COVID -19 pandemic, I have participated in KEYS (Kashiwa Exchange Youth Society) meetings online.

My reason for participating in the sister city exchange program by KIRA was that I wanted to learn more about overseas countries. One of the reasons I wanted to know this was a newspaper article I happened to see, "Japanese Universities Slump in World University Rankings." Although this kind of assessment is only one-sided, it was somewhat discouraging for me as I was preparing for the university entrance exams in Japan. At that time, I began to see the option of going on to an overseas university, and I also thought I wanted to take the initiative in participating in international exchange activities.

Then, as I wished, I entered a university in Wyoming, where I am in the first year of a bachelor's degree program in the College of Liberal Arts. Simultaneously majoring in three departments (Mathematics, Physics, and Biology) is something I did by my own initiative. My experience as an exchange student pushed me to do so. When I had friendly discussions with American high school students, I was shocked by the way they could articulate in their own words the reasons for their choice of university and the major. It led me to realize the importance of reconsidering what common sense is according to my own scale and preferences. Simultaneously majoring in three different departments is the result of this realization. In addition to this, I

have also benefited from my experience as an exchange student. For example, in extracurricular activities at the university, I introduced to the student community the characteristics of Japan and Asia from the perspective of an international student. This was based on my experience of explaining the charm of Kashiwa City when I was an exchange student.

The Wyoming State population is the smallest among the 50 states in the U.S., with about 580,000 people as of 2022. This is about 1.4 times the population of Kashiwa city. On the other hand, Wyoming has an area of approximately 250,000 square kilometers, which is equivalent to about 66% of the land

area of Japan. If you walk for a few minutes from the campus, you will see magnificent nature. Yellowstone National Park, a World Heritage Site, is located in the northwestern part of the state. The low population density also has its benefits. For example, while many universities in U.S. cities are now offering online classes across the board, face-to-face classes are being offered relatively safely at my university. Residents say that life is much the same as before the COVID-19 pandemic.

I am going to participate in KIRA's activities online from Wyoming. I hope to improve my knowledge of the world to help high school students interested in learning practical English and studying abroad in the United States. My

experience as an exchange student was a turning point for me to broaden my horizons and review my way of thinking, including my career decisions. I sincerely hope that the exchange student program will resume as soon as possible. (At the Wyoming campus in April 2022)
